Pastor Sue:

The people walking in darkness have seen a great light. On those living in a pitch-dark land, light has dawned.

You have made the nation great;

you have increased its joy.

They rejoiced before you as with joy at the harvest, as those who divide plunder rejoice.

As on the day of Midian, you ve shattered the yoke that burdened them, the staff on their shoulders,

and the rod of their oppressor.

Because every boot of the thundering warriors, and every garment rolled in blood will be burned, fuel for the fire.

Liturgist:

A child is born to us, a son is given to us, and authority will be on his shoulders. He will be named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Eternal Father, Prince of Peace.

There will be vast authority and endless peace for David s throne and for his kingdom, establishing and sustaining it with justice and righteousness now and forever.

The Witness of Music

During the Puritan Era in England, a number of regional medieval carols were sent underground. Many were not rediscovered until the early twentieth century when Cecil Sharp and Ralph Vaughan Williams began collecting them. Vaughan Williams heard this tune sung in Sussex and published it in 1919. The words were written by Luke Wadding, a 17th Century Irish Bishop.

Gospel Reading

John 1: 1-18 (CEB)

Pastor Sue:

In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God and the Word was God.

The Word was with God in the beginning.

Everything came into being through the Word, and without the Word nothing came into being.

What came into being through the Word was life, and the life was the light for all people.

The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness doesn t extinguish the light.

Liturgist:

A man named John was sent from God.
He came as a witness to testify concerning the light, so that through him everyone would believe in the light.
He himself wasn t the light, but his mission was to testify concerning the light.

The true light that shines on all people was coming into the world.

The light was in the world, and the world came into being through the light, but the world didn t recognize the light.

The light came to his own people, and his own people didn t welcome him.

But those who did welcome him, those who believed in his name, he authorized to become God's children, born not from blood nor from human desire or passion, but born from God.

Pastor Sue:

The Word became flesh and made his home among us. We have seen his glory, glory like that of a father s only son, full of grace and truth.

John testified about him, crying out, This is the one of whom I said, He who comes after me is greater than me because he existed before me."

From his fullness we have all received grace upon grace; as the Law was given through Moses, so grace and truth came into being through Jesus Christ. No one has ever seen God.

God the only Son,

who is at the Father's side,
has made God known.

Litany of Belief

In times when humanity disappoints,
perhaps when even our own thoughts and behaviors disappoint,
it is an important act to call out, name and claim, the consequences of our wrongs.

We come asking again for your strength and wisdom;

As we make this Advent journey, we confess some of our longing is born of envy.

Christ's advent,

some of us struggle inwardly with Gethsemanes of betrayal, loneliness, and brokenness in our relationship with family, neighbor, and community. Clothe us in compassion, that we might forgive ourselves And others as you have forgiven us,
Restoring relationship, repairing that which is broken.
As we pray for the hungry, the ill, the grieving,
we ask for strength to respond to them and their needs

Carol of Peace

"Go Tell It On the Mountain"

154 in New Century

Introduction to the Carol:

Our Carol of Peace this week was created by people who endured brutal hardships as the result of slavery.

But, though people of African descent were ripped from much of their cultural heritage, they maintained their heritage of group song, punctuated by West African rhythms and vocal stylings.

Of course the safest thing for oppressed peoples to sing about was the religious beliefs that, first forced upon them by their oppressors, later gave many hope in the midst of suffering.

"Go Tell It On The Mountain" is probably

the best-known African American Christmas song.

The words "seeker" and "watchman" are thought to have been code words for those seeking freedom on the Underground Railroad.

It was made popular by the Fisk Jubilee Singers in the 19th century as these college students—themselves freed slaves—traveled the country to raise money and awareness.

They were turned away from hotels, railway waiting rooms, and even some churches because of their color.

As we sing, let us honor them, honor all who have endured slavery Let us...

Go tell it on the mountain, over the hills and everywhere. Go tell it on the mountain, that Jesus Christ is born."

... indeed that the Prince of Peace that calls us to break the chains of oppression... is *born!*
